First Green Fair in Willesden

Brent Friends of the Earth invite you to Willesden's first ever "Green Fair" on Saturday, 21st May 2011 outside the Willesden Green Library Centre, from approximately 10am - 5pm.

The aim of the event is to bring together local groups, businesses and individuals with an active interest in the environment and to show Brent residents the options for a low-carbon lifestyle in their area. Invitations for stalls have gone out to a bike-fixing charity, an energy consultancy business and a local honey maker. There will also be demonstrations, for example, of gardening in small spaces, as well as a discussion with local politicians.

The Green Fair is funded by money from the Neighbourhood Working Scheme. It will not aim to make a profit but to improve the network of Brent's vibrant green community.

The Greening of Blenheim Gardens

Blenheim Gardens is on the way to getting a whole new look. Inspired by the installation of attractive new footpaths by Brent Council, residents have got together to develop a project to enhance their tree-lined street even further. Starting with a Community Planting Day in April, they will plant selected tree pits (the areas around the tree bases) with low-growing hardy perennials. Later in the year spring-flowering bulbs will be planted, to give a colourful welcome to Spring 2012.

The group is working in partnership with the Council's Transportation Service Unit, who have prepared the tree pits and filled them with topsoil ready for planting.

The scheme has been generously supported by grants from Brent Council's Ward Working initiative and MapRA's Open Gardens Committee. Donations of plants from residents, and the time and work of the volunteers, will add substantial value. As well as enhancing the appearance of Blenheim Gardens, the initiative will:

- Strengthen the local community by increasing social interaction and community spirit
- Improve biodiversity and environmental sustainability in a road where many of the front gardens are used primarily for vehicle parking
- Increase gardening skills and knowledge about environmental issues
- Provide opportunities for all ages to participate in a healthy outdoor leisure activity, especially for people living in upper flats without access to private gardens.

This is a 'flagship' project within Mapesbury which, it is hoped, will inspire other residents in the area (and in other parts of Brent) to undertake their own initiatives to improve the environment and quality of life in their neighbourhoods.

Meet the Brent Independent Advisory Group at its Stall at the AGM

The Brent Independent Advisory Group, (BIAG) is a community-led independent group chaired by Robert Quaye that acts as 'critical friend' to the Police within the London Borough of Brent. The group represents, and is made up of, local community activists within the borough; its remit is not to make Police policy, but rather to influence and offer advice to the Police on policies and matters of concern to the local community.

The BIAG works alongside the Police and offers its views on the provision of a guardian service, provided by the borough police, and ensures that community comments,

fears and ideas are aired and represented to Senior Officers before final decisions are made that may affect the community of Brent.

The BIAG also acts as a 'scrutiny panel' ensuring transparency and fairness within the decision-making process. It is able to provide critical information during serious incidents in the borough and offers assurance that the Police in the borough are working for the benefit of the community without discrimination or bias. The Group would like to hear about any problems you may have within your community. Meet members of the Group at the AGM.

Police Matters

Mapesbury Safer Neighbourhood Team, working with other Metropolitan police services, has undertaken a number of pro-active operations targeting drug users. These have proved very successful: a number of persons (including some who are wanted in outstanding investigations) have been arrested for offences such as the possession of drugs and/or offensive weapons.

The team continues to work with our colleagues from Brent Council to target fly tippers. Recent results have included the arrest of a disqualified driver and the issue of numerous fines as well as the impounding of uninsured vehicles. Police Community Support Officers continue to attend victims of burglary offering crime prevention advice in an effort to reduce burglaries.

Over the coming months we will be working with colleagues from Barnet and Camden Boroughs as well as enforcement colleagues from Brent Council. These will be

intelligence-led operations in which a locality will be identified and targeted over a period of days. A week of action will take place shortly in Cricklewood Broadway, during which we will be working in partnership with Camden and Barnet Safer Neighbourhood Teams. Also working with us will be departments such as the Brent Council Anti-Social Behaviour Teams utilising the Operation Payback scheme under which offenders on Community Service are brought into the area to clean it up.

If you see anything suspicious please don't hesitate to contact us. Raymond Cohen dies at 91

Many residents especially in Keyes Road will miss Raymond Cohen almost skipping down the road many mornings to visit the shops in Cricklewood Broadway. With a huge smile on his face and an infectious twinkle in his eye, he would stop and chat to passing neighbours. For many years, Raymond was a very active member of the community. He was a musician of the highest caliber: a classical violin soloist leading famous orchestras such as the Royal Philharmonic.

Raymond was a committed family man, happily married for 58 years to concert pianist Anthya Rael, a hugely talented pianist, who had come from her native South Africa to study. They have two children: Gillian is a violinist and Robert, an internationally renowned cellist. Raymond and Robert have given

duo recitals and appeared together in Brahms Double concerto; Anthya joined them to form the Cohen Trio.

Raymond played solo concerts around the world and with the most renowned conductors of the time. He led the orchestra for Frank Sinatra when he was in London and also toured Europe, even Iran and Egypt.

In 1993 Raymond was featured in a BBC radio programme called "The Musical World of Raymond Cohen" in which the entire family took part.

Raymond was a devoted grandfather and many Sunday mornings were spent nurturing his talented grandchildren's love of music. His packed funeral showed clearly that he was a giant of a man both to his family, friends and his beloved music.

Cricklewood Improvement Programme

The aim of CIP is nothing less than to revitalise Cricklewood, developing a safe, healthy and vibrant neighbourhood in which the needs of residents are paramount. The programme is spearheaded by Danny Maher, Chief Executive Officer of Cricklewood Homeless Concern, who has recognised that a major problem lies in the fact that Cricklewood is served by three boroughs, Barnet, Brent and Camden. CIP has already encouraged the involvement of all three councils. From Brent, Cllr Ann John OBE (leader of the council) has pledged her support; so have Navin Shah, Brent's London Assembly member, as well as the councillors representing Mapesbury, Childs Hill and Fortune Green. Brent's Police Commander, Matthew Gardener, and the two commanders from Barnet and Camden are involved and motivated to help. The three SNT Police teams have had meetings with the CIP representative and are already working closely together.

Starting 4th April, a week of initiatives will see a "Clean up Cricklewood" week when the social problems of the Broadway will be targeted. Three boroughs will be working together for the first time

ever to tackle the Broadway in terms of both policing and Streetcare.

CIP will conduct a research study amongst residents and businesses to establish the community's needs and a website is already being designed, posters and flyers are printed and CIP will have a proper Constitution, dedicated to raise the profile with its website and recruit new supporters. Many residents are already on board but we are expecting many more.

To support this work a group is working on researching the history of the Broadway and the individual stories of the residents and traders living in and around it. Many people have arrived in Cricklewood from all over the world and have added a richness to the community. The Pakistani Workers Association (PWA)

has been involved in the Brent Winter Night Shelter project: Route 18 Winter Shelter from 24th to 31st December 2010. It was host to 32 people who had been identified by CHC as needing shelter. They were collected daily at 7 pm from Ashford Road and taken to the Community Centre where they were able to watch TV, eat and sleep. Sleeping bags, pillows and blankets were provided by the project. The men were assessed for the reasons for being homeless and some were able to receive dental care.

The project was launched on 24th December, and there was good coverage from the Muslim radio and national TV in Pakistan.

Whilst it is recognised that working with the homeless is CHC's continuing role, the Chairman of the PWA – Tariq Dar - explained how important it is that the Pakistani community understands the necessity of reaching out and working with the Christian churches, and encouraging others of the community to join in similar initiatives. All faiths should be educated to realise the need for this involvement.

Cricklewood Homeless Concern's Winter Shelter Project

CHC's Winter Shelter project was brought about by a chance conversation three years ago between Charlotte Curran at CHC and Marlon Nelson, who works for the Brent Deanery. Both had concerns about street homelessness particularly in the winter time. So they decided to do something about it and Route 18 Winter Shelter was born.

In its third year now and with growing success, CHC was privileged this year to be joined by the Pakistani Community Centre. It is important that the whole community, and in this case the faith community, be a partner in this project. We will be encouraging other faith groups to join next year to make this a truly inter-faith community project. This latest project has been the best so far. Out of 55 people who were supported, 33 have been housed, 12 have found employment and about 18 are in training courses.

Mapesbury Planning

As new people move into Mapesbury to live we have been heartened by the number turning to MapRA for advice on appropriate design and construction on adaptations to their homes. Unfortunately, we are still having to deal with developers seeking to build on garden space. Three such applications last year were subsequently refused after intensive objection from MapRA and residents alike. Another matter of concern is the attempt by housing associations, other providers of social housing (such as BHP) and groups which own houses divided into bed-sitting rooms to replace windows or effect other works to properties under their control which are of unacceptable design and construction and even against

planning rules in a conservation area. We do not feel that exceptions should be made for these bodies just because they provide social housing. We trust that in future they will take a more responsible attitude and MapRA has offered to make itself available to various housing associations and organisations to discuss proposed works in advance of any application. So far this offer has not been taken up. Constant vigilance is also required by residents to report and tell us about breaches of planning requiring enforcement action. Brent's overstretched resources make it even more important that we should be the eyes and ears on the roads in Mapesbury.

Brent Council planners will be, as usual, in attendance at the AGM.

2. Gill & Paul Weiser, 42 Keyes Road. Award for dedicated window renovation.
3. Special Award to Pat Liston, 50a Keyes Road for transforming the garden frontage of the property to the highest standard.

One Conservation prize in a non-conservation area of Mapesbury
Sybil Goldfoot, 50 Chatsworth Road. The outside of this house has been completely refurbished to the highest standard.

Mapesbury Dell Awards & Gardening Club Information
