# Judy Langley – secretary of MapRA

Judy was the originator of almost everything we do in MapRA. She was born in February 1941 and has died recently at almost 85 years of age. Brought up in Gloucester she was a child actor, appeared in many productions, most notably in West End production of South Pacific. (Others in the cast were young Larry Hagman, Sean Connery and June Whitfield). After some time in rep and panto, she moved into advertising production in Los Angeles. When her father died, she returned to the UK to support her mum. She married Nick in 1976



and after a few years in Norway (Nick was an oil industry engineer) they returned to London and settled in Mapesbury in Exeter Road. Here she became a stalwart of this community, supporting many causes such as Cricklewood Homeless Concern; she joined the MapRA committee and became the driving force behind it for over 20 years. She fought injustice and championed causes and lead an intensely busy social life for the benefit of the community of which she was very proud. She helped and supported local residents in the creation of the Mapesbury Dell. She pioneered the Open Gardens Day and for some time ran it almost single-handed; she pressed for sensible parking policies and was very active on crime, planning and conservation issues. She and Nick (who was MapRA Chair at that time) worked with Susannah Burford to start the Community link clubs. She was a keen supporter of the Labour party but would work with anyone to further the community. She sure knew how to get things done – occasionally employing some histrionics from acting, but she had great charm, treated Council officers with great respect and had them eating out of the palm of her hand. She was awarded the Pride of Brent award for community long service and a lifetime achievement award for services dedicated to Mapesbury. Her indomitable spark, independence, energy and passion are an impossible act to follow. Doubt we shall see the like again. A veritable community pioneering powerhouse.

# Willesden Green Town Team: Report 2023/24 (abbreviated)

Willesden Green Station Gardens Update. The Town Team Gardening Squad have been generously donated some planters by Brent Council. These planters were previously part of the Low Traffic Neighbourhood scheme in the Olive Road area. We plan to repurpose and replant them on the redundant platform 4 in Willesden Green Underground Station over the next months. MAPRA Gardening Club Donation. The Town Team gardeners will use a donation from the MAPRA Gardening Club to freshen up and replant some of the railing planters currently positioned outside Willesden Green Station, and possibly install an additional planter. Transformational Project for the High Street. WGTT are embarking on an ambitious new project, together with local Businesses and Resident's Association, for improvements to infrastructure and the appearance of Willesden Green high street, similar to the Kensal Rise Corridor Scheme (details Kensal corridor | Brent Council). It will require substantial funding and support from the community.

Air pollution is a silent but deadly threat and has been shown to have many adverse health impacts. As part of the mission to improve the environment and well-being of the community WGTT was one of few groups in London to be awarded a sensor as part of the Breathe London Community Programme. The Breathe Node has been busy taking hourly readings of particulate matter and nitrogen dioxide on Willesden Green High Road (outside the library). Readings can be found in real-time on an interactive online map on www.breathelondon.org, showing these results against UK objectives and WHO air quality guidelines.

## Planning and Conservation

The MapRA area includes the Mapesbury Conservation Area, in recognition of the architectural qualities of the area. It brings with it requirements to limit the scope of house alterations to maintain these qualities. This means planning applications are required for anything affecting the front elevation and garden space of our houses, and limits to development at the rear. Full details are clearly laid out in the Mapesbury Conservation Area Design Guide, which can be accessed on the Brent Council website, under Planning and Building Control.

MapRA has a planning sub-committee which comments on planning applications and can sometimes give guidance to householders on what is likely to be acceptable.

Sadly, many householders are unaware of the restrictions and make alterations which result in enforcement action by Brent. If you are aware of unauthorised work, do enquire with Brent or MapRA to see if action needs to be taken.

Many will have noticed the new modern house at 37 Lydford Road. This received planning permission from Brent despite many objections and an apparent disregard of many of the requirements of the Design Guide. The developer then built the house higher and longer than the permitted design. Brent issued an enforcement notice to demolish the upper storey. The developer has since made minor alterations, but his planning application has been recommended for refusal.

# Cleaning / recycling

Brent Council introduced a new street cleaning contract in 2023. There were two main changes:

- (a) a separate 2-weekly recycling collection for cardboard using a blue bag container. There has been a mixed reaction to the blue bags, with numerous residents pointing out that it is not practical to keep the bags inside homes or flats without a garage as they and the cardboard tend to become wet and dirty when left outside. This has been fed back to the Council who are evaluating whether an alternative container might be introduced in the future.
- (b) street cleaning in residential areas is to be more "data led", with the contractor also responding when issues arise, as well as streets being visited on a regular routine basis. Under the new contract, some streets are cleaned every second or fourth week, supplemented by the extra "data led response" and main roads continue to be cleaned daily.

# Cricklewood Town Team report 2023/4 (abbreviated)

Achievements across the year include:

- Station garden. A makeover including spring bulbs donated by 'Bulbs for London' and 'B&Q'. The irrigation has been upgraded and the Christmas lights were enhanced for a better display. The station entrance now has brightly coloured fencing around the revamped bin store. Local artist Caty Delmont created a colourful artwork backdrop to the water feature. Volunteers welcome at 3pm on first Tuesday of the month.
- Cricklewood Lane Market. Cricklewood market is picking up with Caribbean, Lebanese, Pakistani and Filipino stalls with more coming. CTT is bidding to rebrand and give the market an identity as well as host an evening of music and food.
- Eco Events. Two successful events in May and October. The Dr Bikes repair workshops worked non-stop supporting local people's repairs with help from Brent Cycling.
- BWR Project. The Town Team have been very involved in the Brent Women of Renown project, which through partnerships with 6 local Brent schools brought the lives of the pioneering

women to their classrooms. The documentary film was premiered at Kiln! in November to a sellout audience. All information about the project including access to the film is available at https://cricklewood.net/brent-women-of-renown/

- The Chichele Road Pedestrian Crossing is still an ongoing discussion between Barnet and Brent Councils and TfL.
- Ashford Place continues delivering social support services to the residents of Cricklewood and across Brent. The charity has been an important partner to the Cricklewood Town Team since 2010 and is grateful to both MapRA and CTT for supporting vulnerable residents to engage.

We had a glorious community Open Gardens Day on 25 June last year. Over 400 tickets were sold, and we raised over £3000 for charities. There were 10 gardens open to members and friends. People also enjoyed refreshments at the Old Vicarage and many bought plants at the bargain plant sale (which alone made £1500). Thanks to all involved; gardeners, OGD committee, and everyone helping.

The triangle team continue their good work looking after the 4 Triangle Gardens. Pruning, tidying, weeding, planting bulbs. Extra volunteers for occasional 1hr stints always welcome.

## Local Police

The Cricklewood-Mapesbury SNT (Safer Neighbourhood Team) now comprises. Inspector Yu Zhang (covering 11 wards), PS Alan O'Connor (covering 2 wards), PC Dan Novakovic, PC Rishi Selvarajah and PCSO Ajay Dhokia.

Recent issues and activities: The level of burglary has reduced after a spike last year with 7 burglars arrested at the end of the year. There have been anti-social behaviour issues with multi occupancy properties on the ward. The team has closed two addresses recently and working with Brent on two more. Currently operations are ongoing in the Broadway to Kilburn areas due to the increase in crime and anti-social behaviour.

Current priorities are:

- 1 Violence especially focussed on the Cricklewood Broadway and Chichele Road hotspots.
- 2 Burglary.
- 3. Anti-Social Behaviour and drugs. Focus patrols around problem hotspots.
